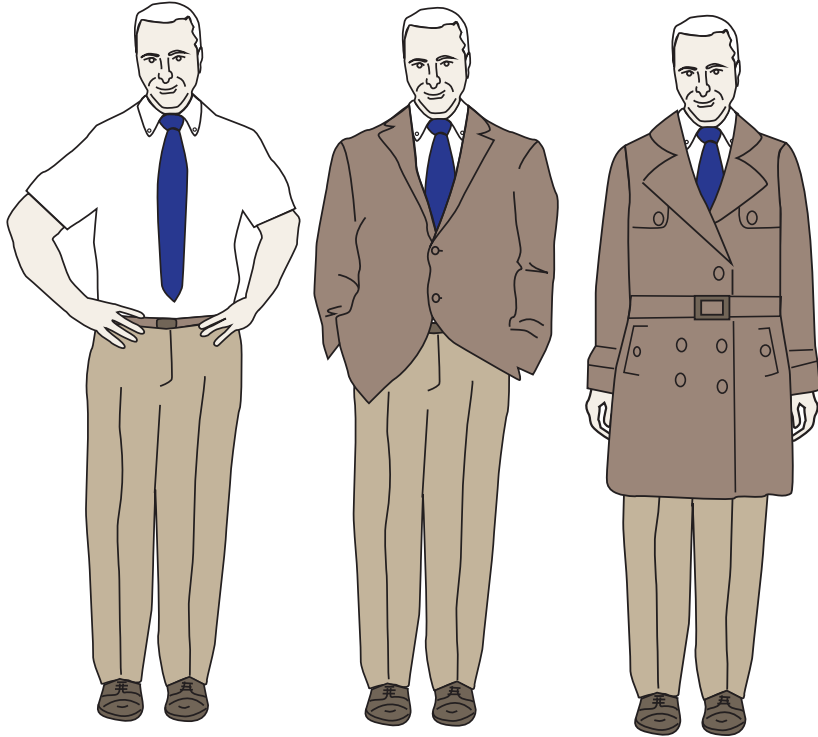
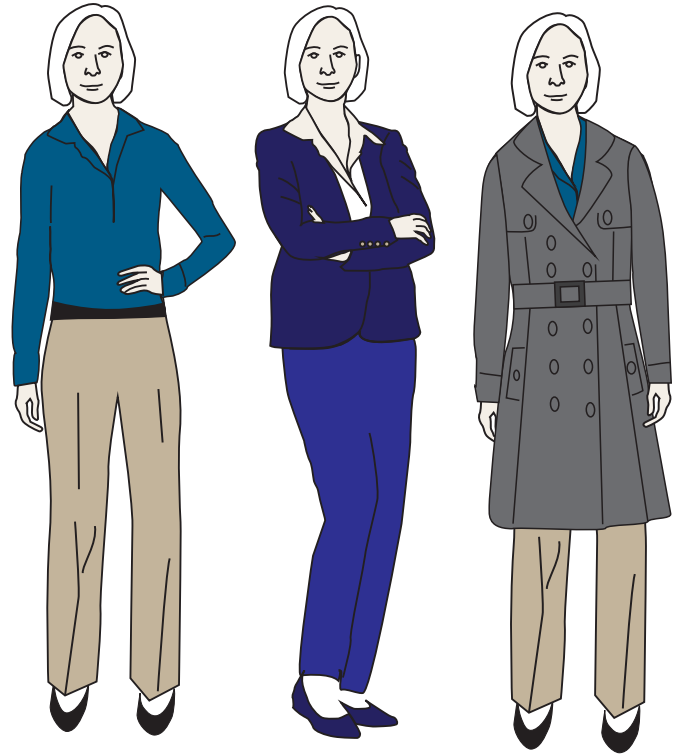


Men's Dress Standards



Women's Dress Standards



In general, clothing must be clean, fit properly and be in good repair without patches or frayed edges. Choose a wardrobe that is flattering to your physical build. If an item of clothing is too small or too tight fitting, do not wear it to work. Clothing must not be too revealing – cleavage, midriffs and/or undergarments must not be showing at work (this includes when sitting, bending over or when arms are lifted up or down). Sweatshirts and denim (shirts, skirts or dresses) are not appropriate.

Men's Dress Code

- Dress shirt with short or long sleeves is to remain tucked in. No rolled up sleeves.
- Coordinating necktie (tied and properly positioned). Brightly colored or themed ties are not considered appropriate.
- Coordinating belt or belt with braces.
- Coordinating dress slacks or suit pants
- Dress shoes and socks of coordinating color, clean and polished.
- Suit jacket or blazer (blue, black, grey or brown)
- Overcoat/Raincoat when appropriate (blue, black, grey or brown). Sweaters are not appropriate unless worn in combination with a suit jacket or blazer.
- Hats, if worn, must be of dress appearance. Baseball caps are not acceptable. Any headgear must be removed upon entering any building or place where the deceased is present.

Women's Dress Code

- Due to the difficult terrain that is incurred on a first call, dresses or high heels are not allowed to ensure safety & functionality.
- Coordinating dress slacks or suit pants should be modest and dark in color, with an appropriately coordinated blouse that is tucked in.
- Hip huggers or low riders are not appropriate and at no time should undergarments (thongs), or lower back above the buttocks be showing, this includes while bending over to move a body or raise the cot up.
- Jewelry and accessories must be inoffensive, conservative, businesslike and modest.
- Tattoos or other forms of "body art or piercing" are to be completely covered at all times.
- Tongue rings, nose rings, eye brow rings must be removed while working.
- Ear piercing shall be limited to one for women and are not acceptable for men
- Items with religious or cultural symbols or significance must be avoided out of respect for the diverse cultural and religious groups of people we assist.
- Sunglasses must never be worn when dealing with families or clients.
